Our center must cooperate with all DCF inspections/investigations. DCF staff may interview both staff members and children.

Our center must post its written statements of philosophy on child discipline in a prominent location and make a copy of it available to parent's upon request. We encourage you to review it and to discuss with us any questions you may have about it.

Our center must post a listing or diagram of those rooms and areas approved by the OOL for the children's use. Please talk to us if you have any questions about the center's space.

Our center must offer parents of enrolled children ample opportunity to assist the center in complying with licensing requirements; and to participate in and observe the activities or operations of the other center should discuss their interest with the center director, who can advise them of what opportunities are available.

Parents of enrolled children may visit our center at any time without having to secure prior approval from the director or any staff member. Please feel free to do so when you can. We welcome visits from our parents.

Our center must inform parents in advance of every field trip, outing, or special event away from the center, and must obtain prior written consent from parents before taking a child on each such trip.

Our center is required to provide reasonable accommodations for children and/or parents with disabilities and to comply with the New Jersey Law Against Discrimination (LAD), P.L. 1945, c. 169 (N.J.S.A. 10:5-1 et seq.), and the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), P.L. 101-336 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.). Anyone who believes the center is not in compliance with these laws may contact the Division on Civil Rights in the New Jersey Department of Law and Public Safety for information about filing an LAD claim at (609) 292-4605 (TTY users may dial 711 to reach the New Jersey Relay Operator and ask for (609) 292-7701), or may contact the United States Department of Justice for information about filing an ADA claim at (800) 514-0301 (voice) or (800) 514-0383 (TTY).

Our center is required, at least annually, to review the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), unsafe children's products list, ensure that items on the list are not at the center, and make the list accessible to staff and parents and/or provide parents with the CPSC website at http://www.cpsc.qov/en/Recalls/Recalls-by-Product/?productID=68364. Internet access may be available at your local library. For more information call the CPSC at (800) 638-2772.

Anyone who has reasonable cause to believe that an enrolled child has been or is being subjected to any form of hitting, corporal punishment, abusive language, ridicule, harsh, humiliating, or frightening treatment, or any other kind of child abuse, neglect tor exploitation by any adult, whether working at the center or not, is required by State law to report the concern immediately to the State Central Registry Hotline, toll free at (877) NJ ABUSE/(877) 652-2873. Such reports may be made anonymously. Parents may secure information about child abuse and neglect by contacting: DCF, Office of Communications and Legislation at (609) 292-0422 or go to www.state.us/dcf/ and select Publications.

INFORMATION TO PARENTS

Under the provisions of the <u>Manual of Requirements for Child Care Centers</u> (N.J.A.C. 10:122), ever licensed child care center in New Jersey must provide to parents of enrolled children written information on parent visitation rights, State licensing requirements, child abuse/neglect reporting requirements and other child care matters. The center must comply with this requirement by reproducing and distributing to parents this written statement, prepared by the Office of Licensing, Child Care & Youth Residential Licensing, in the Department of Children and Families. In keeping with this requirement, the center must secure every parent's signature attesting to his/her receipt of the information.

Our center is required by the State Child Care Center Licensing law to be licensed by the Office of Licensing (OOL), Child Care & Youth Residential Licensing, in the Department of Children and Families (DCF). A copy of our current license must be posted in a prominent location at our center. Look for it when you're in the center.

To be licensed, our center must comply with the <u>Manual of Requirements for Child Care Centers</u> (the official licensing regulations). The regulations cover such areas as: physical environment/life -safety; staff qualifications, supervision, and staff/child ratios; program activities and equipment; health, food and nutrition; rest and sleep requirements; parent/community participation; administrative and record keeping requirements; and others.

Our center must have on the premises a copy of the <u>Manual of Requirements for Child Care Centers</u> and make it available to interested parents for review. If you would like to review our copy, just ask any staff member. Parents may view a copy of the Manual of Requirements on the DCF website at www.state.nj.us/dcf/providers/licensing/laws/index.html or obtain a copy by sending a check or money order for \$5 made payable to the "Treasurer, State of New Jersey", and mailing it to: NJDCF, Office of Licensing, Publication Fees, PO Box 657, Trenton, NJ 08646-0657.

We encourage parents to discuss with us any questions or concerns about the policies and program of the center or the meaning, application or alleged violations of the <u>Manual of Requirements for Child Care Centers</u>. We will be happy to arrange a convenient opportunity for you to review and discuss these matters with us. If you suspect our center may be in violation of licensing requirements, you are entitled to report them to the Office of Licensing toll free at 1 (877) 667-9845. Of course, we would appreciate your bringing these concerns to our attention too.

Our center must have a policy concerning the release of children to parents or people authorized by parents to be responsible for the child. Please discuss with us your plans for your child's departure from the center.

Our center must have a policy about administrating medicine and health care procedures and the management of communicable diseases. Please talk to us about these policies so we can work together to keep our children healthy.

Our center must have a policy concerning the expulsion of children from enrollment at the center. Please review this policy so we can work together to keep your child in our center.

Parents are entitled to review the center's copy of the OOL's Inspection/Violation Reports on the center, which are issued after every State licensing inspection of our center. If there is a licensing complaint investigation, you are entitled to review the OOL's Complaint Investigation Summary Report, as well any letters of enforcement or other actions taken against the center during the current licensing period. Let us know if you wish to review them and we will make them available for your review or you can view them online at https://data.ni.gov/childcare_explore.

REGISTRATION POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

Registration Packets and Health Forms must be received for each participant prior to attending Camptastic. Registration information will be treated in a confidential manner. A non-refundable deposit of \$25 per week must accompany the registration form to secure a spot in the program. When the program fills to capacity, a waiting list will be established.

*Camptastic registration begins on December 1st

All children must be fully toilet trained to enroll in the Camptastic Program.

IMPORTANT— All registrations must be made in person or online at ymcaofmewsa.org. If registering for the program online, a Registration Packet must still be filled out completely and submitted prior to your child's first day. Online registration is available until June 15th.

HEALTH FORM REQUIREMENTS

Required health forms must be submitted along with the registration packet when enrolling your child into a program. Each child is required to submit a Universal Child Health Record (to be completed by a pediatrician) and Immunization Records. Children who are currently enrolled in the Metuchen YMCA Preschool or KEDS programs for the 2019–2020 school year do not need to resubmit any health records.

2020 FEE INFORMATION

The Camptastic program runs for 8 weeks. The Camptastic weekly prices can be found online or at the Membership Service Desk of the Metuchen YMCA.

Payment Due Dates:

Camp weeks 1-4 due on or before June 1st. Camp weeks 5-8 due on or before July 1st.

MEMBERSHIP TO THE METUCHEN BRANCH YMCA

All campers are required to be members of the YMCA of Metuchen, Edison, Woodbridge and South Amboy or will be required to pay a camp registration fee of \$50.

SIBLING DISCOUNT

A 10% discount is offered for the second child enrolled in either Camptastic, Camp Munsee, Camp Lenape or a YMCA child care program. Child must be enrolled 5 days a week. Please notify the child care director to be sure they are aware of siblings.

EARLY BIRD DISCOUNT

Register December 1st through January 31st to receive the 2019 camp rates. Register February 1st through June 1st to receive a \$10 discount for every week of camp that a deposit has been paid for.

CHANGE/CANCELLATION FEES

Change forms are available at the Membership Service desk or from your child's teacher. Deposits are non-refundable for any week of camp that is cancelled. To add on a week of camp the change form must be approved by the child care director or your child's teacher before submitting to the front desk. Any changes made to a registration for a week of camp will incur a \$10 change fee.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Every child deserves a camp experience. Through the Annual Campaign, the Y raises money for camp scholarships. Visit our website to download a financial assistance application www.ymcaofmewsa.org or visit the Metuchen YMCA to pick up an application in person. The deadline for financial assistance is June 1, 2020.

CREDIT CARD DRAFT

The YMCA offers a payment option which automatically charges your weekly fees to your designated credit card. This will help with payments being made on time and will avoid late fees. Credit Card Draft Forms are available at the front desk of the Metuchen Y.

LATE FEES

There is an automatic additional fee of \$20 for any late payment. For consecutive late payments or returned checks, the child is subject to dismissal from the program.

ABSENCES

There are <u>no deductions</u> or refunds for missed days, illness, personal vacations, etc. Enrollment in the program requires full payment each week. Please call or email the child care director or your child's teacher if your child is not attending the program for any reason.

LATE PICK-UP OF CHILDREN

For each pick-up later than the child's scheduled pick-up time, there will be a late fee of \$5 for the first ten minutes and \$1 for every additional minute thereafter. Parents must call if they are going to be late.

VALUABLES AND TOYS

The YMCA is not responsible for lost, stolen or broken items. Therefore, please have your child leave all valuables and expensive items at home. Please label all of your child's belongings (book bags, coats, clothing, towels, etc.)

GUIDELINES FOR POSITIVE DISCIPLINE

Positive Discipline is Effective When Planning Ahead

Positive discipline is a process of teaching children how to behave appropriately. Positive discipline respects the rights of the individual child, the group and the adult. Methods of positive discipline shall be consistent with the age and developmental needs of the children and lead to the ability to develop and maintain self-control.

Positive discipline is different from punishment. Punishment tells children what they should <u>not</u> do: positive discipline tells children what they <u>should</u> do. Punishment teaches fear; positive discipline teaches self-esteem.

	Have a few consistent clear rules that are explained to children and understood by adults.			
	Anticipate potential problems.

	Provide time and space for each child to be alone.

	"Catch the child being good". Respond to and reinforce positive behavior; acknowledge or praise to let the child know you approve of what he/she is doing.			
	Provide positive reinforcement through rewards for good behavior.			
	Use encouragement rather than competition, comparison or criticism.			
	Overlook small annoyances and deliberately ignore provocations.			
	Build and nurture a caring relationship to every child every day.			
	Appreciate the child's point of view.			
	Do not confuse setting boundaries with being "unloving" and not setting boundaries as "loving". Too liberal parameters for children are not how to show love to your child.

	Disciplining a child for failing to eat or sleep or for soiling themselves.			
	Hitting, shaking or other forms of corporal punishment.			
	Using abusive language, ridicule, harsh, frightening or emotional punishment.			
	Engaging in or inflicting any form of child abuse and/or neglect.			
	Withholding food, emotional responses, stimulation or opportunities for rest or sleep.			
	Requiring a child to remain silent or inactive for an inappropriately long period of time.			

Positive discipline takes time, patience, repletion, and the willingness to change the way you deal with children. But it's worth it, because positive discipline works.

POLICY ON THE MANAGEMENT OF COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

If a child exhibits any of the following symptoms, he/she should not attend camp. If such symptoms occur at camp, the child will be removed from the room and you will be called to take him/her home.

Severe pain or discomfort Red eyes with discharge

Acute diarrhea Lethargy

Episodes of acute vomiting Infected, untreated skin patches

Severe coughing Skin lesions that are weeping or bleeding

Yellow eyes or jaundiced skin Difficult or rapid breathing Stiff neck Mouth sores with drooling

Skin rashes in conjunction with fever or behavior changes

Elevated oral temperature of 101.5 degrees Fahrenheit

Once a child is symptom free, or has a health care provider's note stating that the child no longer poses a serious health risk to themselves or others, the child may return to camp unless contraindicated by local health department or Department of Health.

If a child contracts any of the following excludable communicable diseases, please report it to us immediately. The child may not return to camp without a health care provider's note stating that the child presents no risk to himself/herself or others.

If your child is exposed to any communicable disease in our program, the Child Care Director will notify you in writing.

MEDICATIONS

Any medications are to be given to the Director in charge of the program with a form signed by your child's pediatrician. All medication MUST be in the original container.

Any child that is NOT contagious but is still on medication MUST abide by the following:

The child's	physician ı	must prescri	ibe medication.

- Medication must be stored in the ORIGINAL container with the following information:
- ◆child's full name ◆type of medication
- ◆reason for medication ◆dates, dosage and times to be administered

If medication is over the counter, the above stated regulations still apply.

CAR LINE- DROP OFF & PICK UP TIMES

We have a system in place that gives you the option to drop-off and pick-up your child outside of the building. We ask parents to please stay in the car line which takes place outside of the child care entrance of the building. If you wish to speak to your child's teacher please park your car in the parking lot or on a side street. The car line is only used for dropping off and picking up your children. Please do not get out of your cars (except to buckle your child) while on the car line.

Times for the car line:

AM/Full Day Drop-off: 7:55am-8:10am
AM Pick-up: 11:15am-11:30am
PM Drop-off: 12:20pm-12:35pm
PM/Full Day Pick-up: 3:45pm-4:00pm

If you arrive after the car line has ended, please park your car and walk your child into the classroom.

*All children muse be signed in and out every day. Sign-in sheets are available both in the classroom and at the car line.

RELEASES

NO CHILD WILL BE RELEASED TO ANYONE WHOSE NAME DOES NOT APPEAR ON YOUR SIGN-OUT AUTHORIZATION FORM. Please have all necessary guardians listed on your Sign-Out Authorization form. A written note is needed if your child is to be picked up by anyone whose name does not appear on the Authorization Form. Individuals designated to pick up your child must be over 18 years of age. This is to insure the safety and well-being of your child. When an authorized pick-up is ready to remove a child from the Center they must show proper identification before the Center will release the child. (A more detailed Release Policy is available in the classroom's Parent Policy Handbook).

EXPULSION POLICY

The Y reserves the right to immediately dismiss any child from our program who is harmful or a threat to the well-being of the other children and staff. Parents are responsible for any damage their child does to the YMCA property, program areas or activity grounds. All children must comply with program rules and regulations. Parents will be informed if any such behavior occurs. Harmful behavior will lead to suspension and possibly expulsion at the discretion of the Director. (A more detailed Expulsion Policy is available in the classroom's Parent Policy Handbook).

PARENT ACTIONS FOR CHILD'S EXPULSION

Failure to pay/habitual lateness in payments, failure to complete required forms including the child's immunization records, habitual tardiness when picking up your child, or physical or verbal abuse to the staff.

PARENTAL NOTIFICATION

A system of parental notification is in place for the children enrolled in all programs to ensure that information is shared with parents. Teachers are responsible for reporting activities and issues to parents during the drop-off and/or pick-up process. Teachers are responsible for reporting all developmental, emotional and physical changes to a parent as needed. If a Teacher is unable to see a parent by the end of the day, he or she will call the parent with any imperative information. Any injury above the shoulder will be reported to the parent/guardian via telephone call. General program information and events will be shared with families in various ways: flyers, newsletters, email, social media, website, text alerts and other forms of communication will be used as deemed appropriate.

SOCIAL MEDIA POLICY

This policy provides a set of rules and guidelines to inform and guide the behavior of all participants through social media and all forms of electronic and digital communication. This policy is intended to be adaptable to the changes in technology and norms of online communication and behavior to protect the confidentiality of all participants in our programs. It is expected that all participants follow Social Media Guidelines. We do not permit staff to engage with program participants, under the age of 18, utilizing social media. We ask that parents/guardians support the Y in this policy and not participate in or permit social media interaction, texting, chatting, emailing, instant messaging or any additional forms of social media as a way of communication.

We ask that parents/guardians of children in our center utilize the email address provided by the Centers as a way of digital communication. Emailing and texting individual personal staff accounts is not an acceptable means of communication. We also ask that you refrain from including other children, families or the Y from any personal posts to social media sites. Please be respectful and mindful of privacy and confidentiality.

EMERGENCY ACTION PLAN

There may be a time when we need to evacuate the building immediately and seek shelter away from 65 High Street. In such an instance, we have secured The Reformed Church across the street from the YMCA at the corner of Lake and High Street. Prepared emergency kits and contact information will go with the children. We also conduct monthly fire and lockdown drills with the staff and the children.

SNACK

The Metuchen Y will provide a snack for the children every morning and afternoon. The snack is prepared with a healthy mindset, excludes food containing trans-fats and follows all HEPA guidelines. If your child has any food allergies, please make sure to list them on your child's registration form and to inform your child's teacher.

LUNCH

Children who attend camp full day must bring a lunch from home. Please send a sandwich, snack, a drink and all necessary utensils for your child. Lunch time is 11:30am-12:00pm. A pizza lunch option is offered on Fridays for a small fee.

REST TIME

All three year old children who are enrolled in the full day program are required to have a thirty minute rest time. The children will be provided with a rest mat at the center. Each child will need to bring a sheet (a crib sheet will fit the mat) and a blanket from home. The sheet and blanket will be sent home with the children every Friday to be washed and need to be returned on Monday morning.

OUTDOOR PLAY

With the exception of inclement weather the children will play outside everyday. They must be dressed appropriately for the weather. All children must wear closed-toe shoes for the playground. Our playground has a lot of climbing equipment; children who wear sandals or open-toed shoes will not be permitted to play on the playground that day.

SWIMMING

Children enrolled in the Camptastic program will be provided with a 30 minute swim lesson in the pool with a certified swim instructor. A lifeguard is on duty at all times and a classroom teacher will also supervise the children while they are in the pool. Each child needs to bring a swimsuit and towel to school on the day of their swim lesson. It is also required that children with hair below their chin wear a bathing cap; which can be purchased at the member service desk.

During the summer we are scheduled to swim almost everyday. Depending on the amount of children we have enrolled each day will determine how many times a week your child will swim. Please send your child to camp with his/her swim belongings **everyday**. On days that there is not a swim lesson offered we will be going outside to play in the Sprinklers (weather permitting).
