ose Cushing attended Y-USA's New CEO Training at their offices in Chicago from November 15-18th. This training is encouraged for first-time YMCA CEO's hired within the past 12 months. In addition to orienting CEO's through the vast network of Y-USA support services for local Association Offices, the training offers participants the opportunity to understand the role of CEO in operational functions such as fiscal leadership, strategic planning, human resources, marketing and communications, financial development, facility management and Board engagement. Personal leadership assessment and self-discovery of personal development plans are also enhanced through this training. In addition to this 4-day on-site training, pre– and post-webinars are offered, including two risk management trainings, which will result in strong organizational leadership and commitment to the Y movement.

On Saturday, November 12th, the Historical Society of Perth Amboy unveiled a new plaque which was placed in front of the South Amboy YMCA, the previous grounds of the South Amboy Terra Cotta Works, to commemorate one of the City's oldest industries. This marker was made possible through a program run by the Middlesex County Cultural & Heritage Commission and funded by the Middlesex County Freeholders.

As background, the South Amboy Terra Cotta Company was built in 1903, where local clay deposits were dug for the production of brick, tiles, terra cotta and other ceramic products. The industry prospered during the Industrial Revolution and at one time New Jersey led the nation in the production of decorative terra cotta. In 1927, due to rising costs, the company merged with the Federal Seaboard Terra Cotta Corporation which had factories in Perth Amboy and Woodbridge. By the 1930's most terra cotta companies had shut down, as the prevailing taste in architectural design had shifted to a preference for minimally-ornamental modern buildings. The South Amboy Plant closed its doors in 1941 and moved its operation to Perth Amboy.



In 2001, while exploring a heavily overgrown area, staff of the Middlesex County Cultural and Heritage Commission discovered a retaining wall made from discarded terra cotta pieces. The wall, which contained many types of products the company produced over its 28 year history, was photographed and documented. Some of the discovered pieces were salvaged and are now in private collections. The rest were discarded when the property was developed.

She has been successful in helping individuals build their unique narrative from an understanding and analysis of multiple aspects of their unique profile.

The workshops will be held at the Metuchen YMCA on Thursday, December 15th at 7:00 p.m. and at the Edison YMCA on Saturday, December 17th at 1:00 p.m.

LET ME TELL YOU MY STORY

Jhumur has also already held two Personal Statement Writing Workshops on December 8th

and 10th at the Edison YMCA for students so that she could share her essay consulting expertise to allay anxiety around the process of writing a statement of purpose and other admission essays. Her curriculum included:

- ☑ Developing an understanding of the different spaces allocated in the application where information can be shared about the applicant.
- ☑ Understanding the value of creating an individual data dashboard—inventorying all things about YOU on there.
- ✓ Learning how to use storyboard techniques to kick start essay writing.

Jhumur filled the classes to maximum capacity with ten participants in each class and is hoping to hold more workshops in 2017.

The Edison Y will be offering a Gujarati Language and Culture Program class, a three-week (20 hour) project based language immersion program for 12-15 elementary, middle and high school heritage and non-heritage learners, is focused on the theme of "Storytelling Through Cultural Experiences", that provides opportunities for students to use the language for a variety of real life purposes.

The program's goals aim at increasing students' content knowledge and cultural experience in story telling under three sub-themes of "Personal, Family and Immigration stories", leading to prepare students own narratives, are outlined in the curricula.

Upon program completion, students will be able to communicate in culturally appropriate ways; understand and comprehend courtesy expressions and describe in simple languages some familiar and unfamiliar real life situations producing evidences of their learning. They will be able to write simple text in Gujarati and reflect upon their thoughts and ideas in culturally appropriate context. An online follow-up learning program during the post program period will be implemented to help learners sustain and improve their skills and continue Gujarati and experiencing its culture.

The class begins in February and is already filled to maximum capacity!

ULTURE OF HEALTH CONFERENCE.

On Wednesday, November 30th, YMCA staff attended the Building a Culture of Health in New Jersey Conference at the Pines Manor in Edison. This conference focused on the linkage between health and health care, how policy and environment changes can better support children, family and community life, the connection between equity and opportunity, and the impact of private and public decision-making on health. They also explored how New Jersey must balance the cost, benefits and effectiveness of treatment and prevention to improve the health of all residents.

The keynote speaker was Dr. Maya Rockeymoore, President and CEO of Global Policy Solutions a Washington, D.C.-based consulting firm and President of the Center for Global Policy Solutions, a social change nonprofit dedicated to making policy work for people and their environments. Her keynote address was "The Inclusion Revolution: Advancing a Health Equity Agenda for the Nation", where she discussed how deep disparities exist within health and its social determinants, failing to ensure that all



members of society have a healthy and quality life. Her presentation discussed how to pursue and actualize the upside of the social determinants of health while ensuring that they are evenly and deeply distributed across the population groups.

Conference workshops included Early Childhood Obesity Prevention, Addressing Behavioral Health to Build a Culture of Health, Engaging Youth-Our Next Generation of Civic Leaders, Evaluation and Measure are not Four-Letter Words! and Building a Culture of Health through Hospital-Community Partnerships.

AUTISM SWIMS AT METUCHEN

The Metuchen Y is pleased to announce a new swimming program called "Autism Swims". This program was started after a special education teacher Megan Mahoney from Thomas Jefferson Middle School in Edison contacted the Y about setting up swimming lessons for her group of autistic students. The Y was happy to work with Megan to set up a schedule for her and her students. It is common knowledge that children with Autism are drawn to the water, and rates of drowning are very high. In fact, 91% of deaths in autistic children are due to drowning. Learning to swim will not only save lives, but will give the children



confidence, coordination and reduce anxiety. It also gives them a great way to exercise and enjoy the water. What is unique about this program is that Megan and three assistant teachers join the students in the pool,



making the children feel more comfortable in a new environment. Another middle school, Woodrow Wilson, has just expressed interest in this class and is working with Marie Patterson to set up a schedule. The goal is to offer the program to as many middle schools in the area as possible, with the hope of giving as many children as possible who have been diagnosed with Autism a chance to learn how to swim.

The YMCA has submitted a grant application to Autism Speaks in the hopes of securing funding to be able to offer swimming scholarships to eligible students who are from financially disadvantaged families.

Thursdays from 4:30-5:30pm during the Fall II session. Here is a sampling of a few of the workshops that have been presented at the South Amboy YMCA:

EARTHWORKS — Take a voyage to the center of the Earth! We'll investigate the powerful process that shapes our planet and forms remarkable rocks, magnificent minerals, and glittering gems! Children will take home Ultraviolet Detectors which they build themselves.

MAD SCIENCE MACHINES — Peek into a class to watch elementary-age engineers hard at work with pulleys and levers. They will design, problem-solve, and have a whole lot of fun! Students will even take home a cool Mad Science Machine that they build themselves.





MOVIE EFFECTS - Grab your popcorn but don't sit

back...we're going to learn first hand how advances in science and technology make our favorite special effects possible! Children will take home a Cartoon Creator that they've made themselves! It's Einstein meets Spielberg in a class of 3...2...1...action!

RADICAL ROBOTS—Who isn't fascinated by the wonderful world of robotics! Throughout this course, children will get the opportunity to act out a robot,

remote control device, and an automaton. In addition, students will learn how to use the element of sound to control an automaton, make a robot score a goal in an exciting game of soccer, and attempt to move a robot through a challenging maze!

SEER SURVEY
