# TOT TROT AND YOUTH FUN RUN

Always a favorite event of staff and families, the Child Care Services Branch of the YMCA of MEWSA hosted the 8th Annual Tot Trot and Family Fun Run on Sunday, October 9th. Even though the weather was cold and rainy, that did not stop the



enthusiasm of the competitors. The event was moved in to the Metuchen High School gym, and went off as planned.

This charity event, started in 2008, continues to help families who need financial assistance when they are unable to pay the full cost of childcare. The fund also provides aid to families in crisis and allows us to temporarily provide tuition assistance in the event of a family emergency. This year over \$7,000 was raised! The event is sponsored by Metuchen Savings Bank, JFK Medical Center, Kinder Pediatric, Expert Lawn Service, Boyt Drugs and many more.

There were 155 participants this year. The first set of races was held for children between the ages of 2-5. Races were organized by age group, with each age group running their own race. Following the Tot Trot was the Youth Fun Run for ages 6-12. All participants received a medal, t-shirt and gift bag.

There were also vendors, crafts and lots of activities including crafts, face painting, tattoos and a bouncy house for a day filled with fun for all.

# BOARD CONDUCTS SELF-ASSESSMENT

Based on the recommendation of the YMCA Board Governance Committee, and with the assistance of Linda Schreiber, Resource Director for Y-USA, the Board of Directors conducted a self-assessment on Wednesday, October 26th. The purpose of a self-assessment is to evaluate a Board's strengths and weaknesses and create an Action Plan to address areas needing improvement. Having an effective, cause-drive Board with committed, engaged Board members strengthens the Y's position to further the mission for youth development, healthy living and social responsibility.

After a fun ice breaker, Linda Schreiber gave her PowerPoint presentation "Building Strong Board Partnerships", which focused on working within the three modes of governance leadership to make the best decisions: fiduciary, strategic and generative, and how to develop the most effective volunteer base for success using the six behavioral indicators of the YMCA outlined in the Board Leadership Competency Model. The Board chose two of the six competency indicators for discussion and self-evaluation, specifically, Inclusion and Functional Expertise. The Board broke into two focus groups and each group had an opportunity to discuss both competency indicators. Afterwards, group notes were shared and an open discussion followed giving Board members an opportunity to suggest ways on how to improve the effectiveness of the Board. The results of this meeting will be summarized and given to the Board Governance Committee, who will devise an Action Plan on how to best implement identified areas of improvement.

As Linda noted at the beginning of the evening, the YMCA of MEWSA has one of the most high-functioning Board of Directors that she has known in her 20+ year tenure with YMCAs. Rose also commended the Board for taking time out of their hectic schedules to attend the special focus group session and said that it is because of them that the Y is where it is, and that she is truly grateful to have such dedicated and professional Board members.

# STEM GRANT RECEIVED FOR SOUTH AMBOY

The YMCA recently received notification from PNC Bank that their grant application was approved for a STEM Program at South Amboy! The grant award is for \$7,500 and is for the implementation of a Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) Program for South Amboy's Ready...Set...Learn early education program. This program is geared for 2-4 year olds and focuses on Kindergarten readiness skills. The STEM Program will provide a wonderful opportunity for these young children to build problem-solving and analytical skills, increase career opportunities later in life, and increase a sense of belonging and relationships.



### SPOOKTACULAR FUN AT THE YMCA BRANCHES!





The morning training sessions included *All Together Better-The Many Dimensions of Diversity* which focused on enhancing staff and volunteer cultural competence, facilitating bridge building and encouragement engagement in diversity, inclusion and global work among all YMCA staff and volunteers, and *An Introduction to Gender Identity and Gender Expression* which focused on exploring issues relating to how spaces that are generally open to persons of a specific gender, should deal with people who are gender affirmed and/or gender diverse.
