
SAY CELEBRATES THE FOURTH OF JULY

Oftentimes, knowing that she had just completed yet another round of chemotherapy, she would walk through the door, ready to talk about finances, budgets and Strategic Plan goals. Pat's passion was working with finances, and nothing made her happier than combing through a budget and looking for ways to increase revenue, programs and membership. She was deeply committed to the mission of the Y and her passing leaves a gaping hole in the organization.

Pat can teach us all the power of sheer intention, strong will and compassion. Even in her final moments, the Y was her focus—asking friends and family to make donations to the Y in lieu of flowers, knowing that the money raised would go to families in our communities who truly need it.

Her word, deeds and actions will never be forgotten, at the Y and in the community and her spirit will live on in the hearts of many.

four weeks of summer camp this year, thanks to a pilot sponsorship program through Edison Township.


The trip to the Aquarium capped off their camp theme of Water in our World. The campers learned the role that water plays in our everyday lives and in life itself.


